DIRECTORS' REPORT

28th February 2015

The directors (trustees) present their report and the financial statements for the period ended 28th February 2015. The financial statements comply with the requirements of the company's Memorandum and Articles of Association and have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting by Charities" (revised 2005) and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008).

None of the trustees has any beneficial interest in the company. The trustees do not receive any remuneration for their services as trustees.

Structure, governance and management

The overall management and policy decisions of the company are the responsibility of the board of directors (trustees) who are elected under the terms of the company's Articles of Association. The trustees are appointed by the members at the AGM and retire in rotation.

Objectives and Activities

The principle objects of the charitable company are: to manage community land and associated assets for the benefit of the community and the public in general; to provide or assist in providing recreational facilities for the community and public at large; to advance community development; and to advance environmental protection or improvement. The company was formed to benefit the community of Lower Strathglass, Inverness-shire, defined by the postcode units IV47AD, IV47AE, IV47AF, IV47AG, IV47AQ, IV47EY, IV47JJ, IV47JL, IV47JN, IV47JR and Eilean Aigas.

Achievements and performance

At the start of the year ACF were still pursuing plans to purchase three parcels of Aigas Forest surrounding the village of Crask of Aigas and to employ a Development Officer using a Scottish Land Fund grant secured for this purpose along with additional funds secured from the SSE Highland Sustainable Development Fund, The Highland Council and community donations. In July 2014, following discussions with Highlands and Islands Enterprise, it was confirmed that an application to the Scottish Land Fund to support purchase of the whole forest would not be judged "State Aid". With this news the purchase process for the smaller parcels was put on hold and in September 2014 an application was submitted to the Land Fund for 90% of the purchase price of £760,000 for the whole of Aigas Forest. This grant was approved in November 2014. Match funding was then secured from The Aigas Trust along with an additional contribution from The Highland Council. With all funding in place Macleod and MacCallum were contracted to provide legal representation and negotiations over purchase were initiated. At year end these were close to completion.

With the Scottish Land Fund grant secured, the post of Development Officer at ACF was advertised and filled with the successful candidate starting on 1st September 2014. In advance of the purchase of the forest the Development Officer undertook to consult with local stakeholders; developed contacts with other bodies in a position to support ACF activity e.g. Scottish Woodlands; and investigated options for inclusion in the long term forest design plan.

DIRECTORS' REPORT (continued)

Plans for future periods

The transfer of Aigas Forest to community ownership was completed on 5th March 2015. With ownership secured, focus will shift to delivering the economic, social and environmental benefits for the local community identified in early feasibility studies and grant applications.

During May a series of four community consultation walks were held which attracted over 70 people. These allowed community members to input to the development of the long term forest design plan at an early stage. The design plan, which requires formal consultation and then approval by the Forestry Commission Scotland Conservancy office, is due for completion in the Spring/Summer 2016. In terms of forest management ACF would like to convert Aigas Forest to a more diverse woodland incorporating public access, while still generating local jobs and income for management. The forest at present is very evenly aged having largely been planted in the 1960's. Traditional commercial management would see this clear felled in large blocks and restocked with predominantly conifer species. The aim is to move, where possible, to continuous cover forestry (CCF), retaining permanent tree cover but producing timber from thinning and selective felling. This will however take some time to achieve.

ACF are also developing partnerships with local education providers Aigas Field Centre and Teanassie Primary School. The Forest is being offered as a teaching resource to both organisations and discussions are ongoing regarding other partnership activities.

Financial review and Reserves

During the period ended 28th February 2015, the company recorded net incoming resources on Unrestricted Funds of £1,210 (2014, net outgoing resources £33) and net incoming resources on Restricted Funds of £775,474 (2014, net outgoing resources of £1,279). Total funds per the Balance Sheet at 28th February 2015 totalled £782,320 comprising Unrestricted Funds £1,610 and Restricted Funds of £780,710 (see notes 13 and 14 of the accounts). The trustees have reviewed the reserves of the charity at 28th February 2015 and consider that it will have adequate reserves/resources to support the continuation of its current activities for the foreseeable future.

Risk Management

The directors have assessed the major risks to which the charitable company is exposed and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Statement of Directors' (Trustees') responsibilities

Company and charity law requires the directors (trustees) to prepare financial statements for each financial period which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the directors (trustees) are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- Observe the methods and principles in the Charitable SORP; and
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will
 continue in business.

The directors' (trustees) have overall responsibility for ensuring that the charitable company has appropriate systems of controls, financial and otherwise. They are also responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

We have audited the financial statements of Aigas Community Forest for the year ended 28 February 2015 on pages 7 to 13. NOTES ON FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

28th February 2015

1 Status of the company

Aigas Community Forest is a company limited by guarantee and does not have a share capital. The company is exempted from using the word limited in its name. The liability of the members is limited and will not exceed £1 in the event of the company being wound up.

2 Accounting policies

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost accounting rules, in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting by Charities (revised 2005) and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008). The financial statements also comply with the terms of the Charities Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006.

Donations and donated services and facilities

All donations received are credited to the Income and Expenditure account in the year to which they relate. Donations received or earmarked for specific purposes are accounted for as restricted funds. Donated services and facilities are recognised in the Income and Expenditure account at the estimated value to the charity of the service or facility provided.

Grants receivable

Grants receivable are credited to the Income and Expenditure account in the year to which they relate. Grants receivable or earmarked for specific purposes are accounted for as restricted funds.

Income

Income has been classified under the following headings:

Voluntary income – This comprises resources generated from voluntary sources including, for example donations and grants where the donor does not receive any direct return as a result of the donation.

Activities for generating funds – This comprises fund-raising activities carried out by the charity to generate incoming resources which will be used to undertake its charitable activities.

Investment income - This comprises incoming resources from investment assets, for example bank interest received.

Charitable activities — This comprises all incoming resources received, which are a payment for goods and services provided for the benefit of the charity's beneficiaries. It includes trading activities undertaken in furtherance of the charity's objects and those grants, which have conditions, which make them similar in economic terms to trading income.

Expenditure

Expenditure has been classified into the following headings:

Costs of generating voluntary income – This comprises costs, which are associated with generating incoming resources from all sources other than from undertaking charitable activities, for example the costs associated with fundraising activities.

Charitable activities – This comprises all resources expended by the charity in undertaking its work to meet its charitable objectives. Such costs include the direct costs of the charitable activities together with those support costs incurred that enable these activities to be undertaken.

Governance costs - This comprises the cost of governance arrangements, which relate to the general running of the charity.

Capitalisation policy - Capital items costing less than £500 are not capitalised.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds - These are funds which the directors are free to use in accordance with the charitable objects.

Restricted funds - These are funds, which are restricted for use for specific purposes.

Purposes of Restricted Funds

Valuation of Aigas Forest

Funding of £2,9 $\overline{00}$ was received during the year ended 28 February 2012 from Forestry Commission Scotland for the purposes of funding a valuation from the Valuation Office Agency along with related professional input to the valuation. As shown above, the final £293 of this funding was spent during the year.

Development worker project (including costs of lease/purchase of the forest)

During the year ended 28th February 2013, the company secured a package of financial assistance, totalling £15,000, comprising (maximum) grants of £3,000 from Highland Council Discretionary Budget, £4,500 from Forestry Commission Scotland Seedcorn Funding, £7,500 from Highlands and Islands Enterprise, The purposes of the project were: to employ a part time Development Worker; to cover the costs of obtaining professional advice on the development of a Scottish Land Fund grant application and effective business plan; and to help meet legal/valuation costs of lease/purchase of the forest. The balance carried forward at 28 February 2015 is £1,118.

Forest purchase fund

During the year, the company received further funding of £762,000 towards the purchase of Aigas forest, comprising; grants from: Scottish Land Fund, £690,000; the Aigas Trust, £50,000; Scottish and Southern Energy £20,000; and Highland Council Ward Discretionary grant £2,000. The balance carried forward towards the purchase of Aigas Forest in March 2015 is £765,000, of which £6,000 was provided to cover legal and professional fees (see note 14 Post Balance Sheet Events).

Development Officer fund

During the year, the Scottish Land Fund approved grant assistance of £50,000 towards the costs and expenses of employing a Development Officer for a two year period. The Development Officer commenced employment in September 2015. £25,000 was received during the period, of which £12,592 remained unspent at the year end.

Bank of Scotland Community fund

During the year, Aigas Community Forrest were awarded a grant of £2,000 from the Bank of Scotland Community fund towards the purchase of forest equipment. The balance carried forward at 28 February 2015 is £2,000.

14 Post Balance Sheet Events

Aigas Community Forest purchased Aigas Forest from the Forestry Commission on 5th March 2015 for £760,000 plus legal fees and costs totaling £5,039. The restricted fund balances of £759,000 (for forest purchase) and £6,000 (for legal and professional costs) carried forward at 28 February 2015 and comprising grants from several sources (as described in note 13 above) were applied towards the purchase and related legal costs.
